

### BOBCAT HEADLINES

- Nick Wohlfarth ran for 382 yards and 7 touchdowns in a record-breaking performance vs. Summerfield
- Boys cross country joined the girls squad as Whiteford had two cross country teams for the first time in school history. Jim Hojnacki coached both squads
- The volleyball team had a best-ever 32 victories
- Lindsey Bixler made a record 35 3-pointers
- Kris Hubbard ended her basketball coaching career with a career record of 435-225
- Corey Ovall won two MVP honors for Whiteford
- Brad Stevens took over the boys basketball team



**Nick Wohlfarth** played in only four games but had a big impact on the season for the Bobcat football team, rushing for 1,000 yards in those four game.

### NUMBERS & NOTES

**GIRLS BASKETBALL:** Kris Hubbard's final season coaching the Whiteford girls basketball team was a winner as the Bobcats won 13 times, including two over arch-rival Summerfield. Cassie Scott led the team in scoring and rebounds and Lindsey Bixler made 35 3-pointers and led the team in assists.

**GOLF:** Dustin Carter tied for the Regional title and the Bobcats qualified for the state meet a second straight season.

**FOOTBALL:** What began as one of the most promising seasons in Whiteford history ended with yet another playoff run and four road victories for a veteran team.

Nick Wohlfarth, a returning All-Stater, ran for 1,000 yards in the first four games of the season, including a record-smashing 382-yard rushing performance against archrival Summerfield. His season ended with an injury at Whitmore Lake, but the

Bobcats still made it to the playoffs, a 35-6 loss to Harper Woods Trinity.

Jed Bunge led the team in passing, Brandon Ybarra was once again a threat to score everytime he touched the ball and Corey Ovall was team MVP after recording nine sacks and three fumble recoveries.

**BOYS BASKETBALL:** 1984 Whiteford graduate Brad Stevens became the fifth coach in Whiteford history, succeeding John Rice. His first Bobcat unit featured transfer Nick Schmidt, returning starter Brandon Ybarra and holdover Jake Gust.

Stevens won seven games in his first season. One of the 14 losses, ironically, was to Rice, who took over at Ann Arbor Gabriel Richard and beat Whiteford, at Whiteford, in the first Bobcat game of the year.

**BASEBALL:** Whiteford bounced back for a winning season, despite a 1-5 start. Chuck Fritz won six games and had 55 strikeouts.

Jake Gust batted .385, tops on the team, while Brandon Ybarra had a solid season behind the plate and batted in 22 with 3 triples and 3 home runs.

**TRACK:** The Bobcat track team continued its rise, winning the TCC championship, placing fourth in the Regional and fifth at the state meet. Keagan Puse was 2nd in the low hurdles, Corey Ovall third in the discus and 10th in the shot put and Alan Shepherd 7th in the 800 at the state meet. Puse and Ovall won Regional titles.

**SOFTBALL:** The Bobcats didn't win a trophy in 2004, but did manage 21 victories. Jill Strahan was an All-Region choice after hitting .414 with 14 extra-base hits, including three home runs. Grace Lee won 14 games on the mound. Cassie Scott scored 35 runs.
